
A Medical Spelling Dictionary for Firefox
with Canadian Medical Terms, Drug Names and Spellings

Peter Hutten-Czapski has struck again, and has created a medical spelling dictionary add-on for Firefox, that combines British-English spelling with Canadian drug names and medical terms. 
Further installation how-to:

Click the "Add to Firefox" button

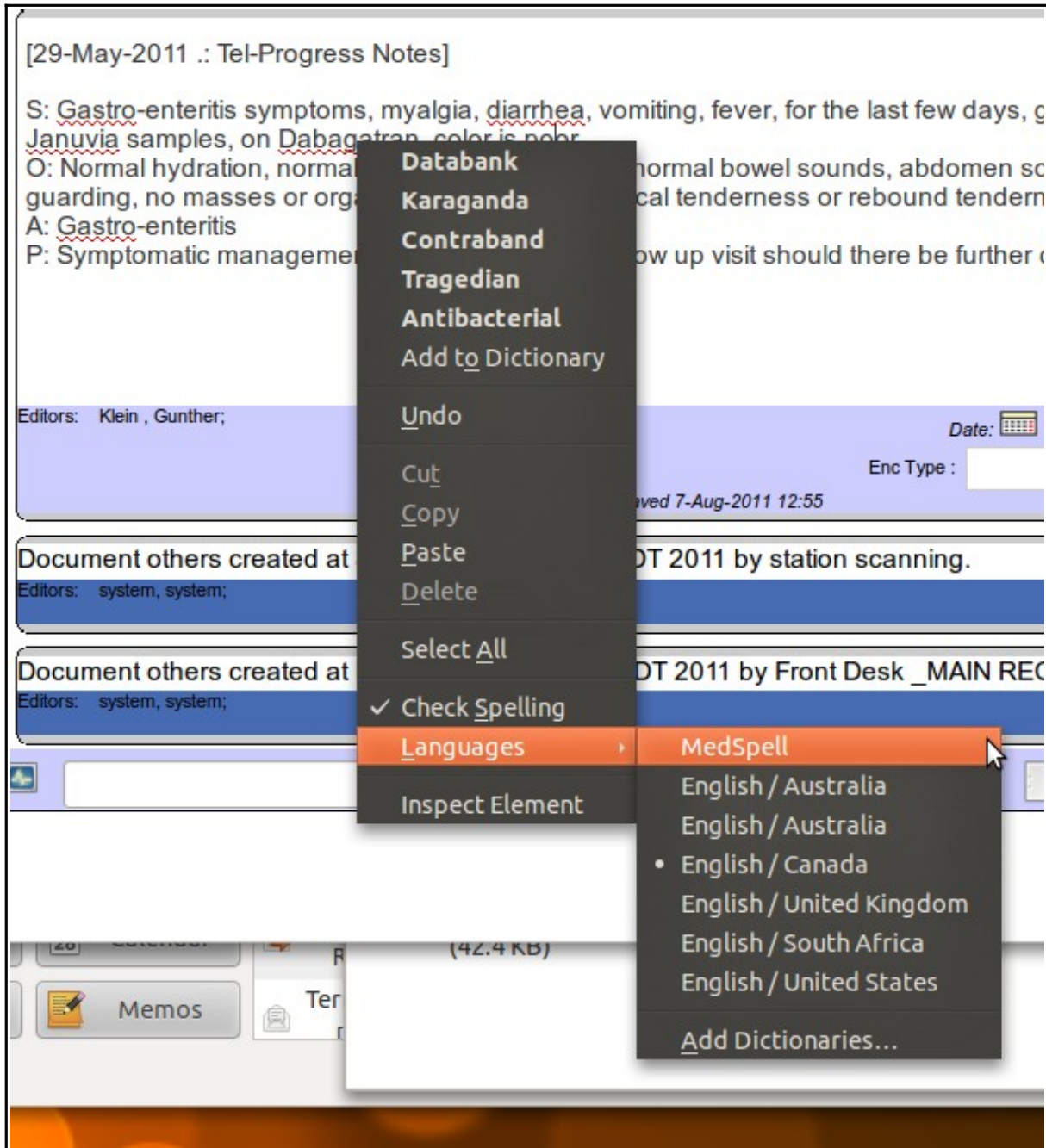
Click "Install" in the install dialogue:



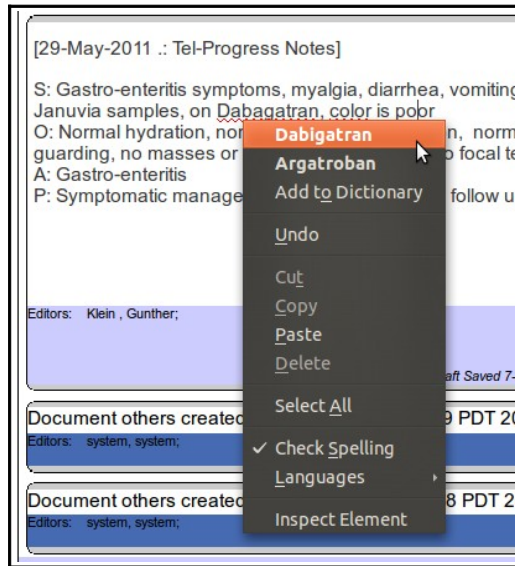

You'll be prompted to restart Firefox. So restart it.

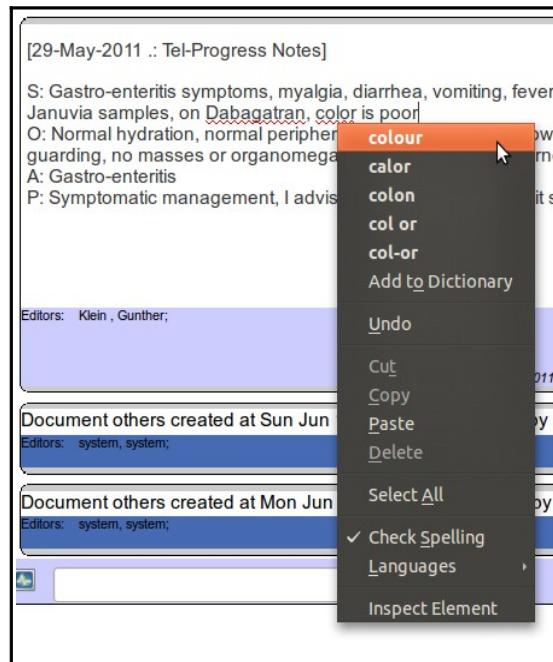
Open your favourite test patient in Firefox. Type the drug name "Dagabitran" (make sure to spell it wrong) and the word colour (spelled the British way). Your default US-English spelling dictionary in Firefox should highlight the word in red. Right-click on the word, and select "Languages" from the drop down, which will show you a list of installed spelling dictionaries in your Firefox. Click on "MedSpell"



Now click the word Dagibatran (wrong spelling) again. You should see the correct spelling presented in the menu



Next right-click the word "color" and see the British-English spelling presented (After all we're still supposed to speak the Queen's English in Canada)
